

# **Ready - Respectful - Responsible**

Dear Parent/Carer,

I had the pleasure of meeting with the **John Colet primary group of Head Teachers and representatives face-to-face this week** for the first time. There was a terrific sense of professional support and energy around the table and it was rewarding to feel and see a group of **educational leaders** all on the same page **battling ferociously with insanely strained budgets, building issues, human resources, challenging conversations and the terrain of an uncertain future**. However, at the centre of these challenges was a steely determination to do the **best for children** - a salient reminder that educational leaders have an incredible number of variables to balance, assess and act upon **in their pursuit of the best education they can provide.** Not easy when too much short-term thinking at a national level has led to a 'hand to mouth' culture across many of our public services.

Last week was awash with discussions surrounding education. School holidays and attendance were 'hot potato' items in the media. This was hard on the heels of the DFE's guidance on mobile phone use in schools. I have to say there is much hot air around these issues but often very little substance behind any form of guidance or policy. The general direction of travel also seems to be about pushing even more responsibility on to individual schools hence avoiding a commitment in full to an ideal or policy. This can create inconsistencies across schools which can be divisive. At JCS we stand back a little from some of this hot air rhetoric and try hard to focus on practical, partnership based policies that support our community in a 'common sense' fashion. (Not easy, but we try!).

A huge thank you to all staff who contributed to our first year 11 boost day on Tuesday during which we explored active revision techniques, visualisation and memory techniques. This was done through workshops, assemblies and presentations. It was topped off with a very well attended parents evening where we shared the themes of the day with parents and offered up some top tips that parent/carers could utilise in support of the revision process. One of the strategies we gave parents was based on the 'protege' effect. This is a very simple technique where you as parent or carer simply ask your child to teach you about some knowledge learnt in school. The very act of teaching strengthens memory and is an excellent form of revision. This does not need to wait until Year 11. I would recommend you start this now; perhaps whilst walking or over the family meal - Ask for your child to teach you something they have learned from the school day; by doing this you will be helping to consolidate their learning (you might also be increasing your own knowledge!)

Thank you to Year 8 students and parents for ensuring that the GCSE Options were submitted on time! The allocation puzzle is now well underway and parents will shortly receive notification of the Options their child has selected. Please ensure you check this information so there are no surprises in the summer term when allocations are finalised.

Next week I will be outlining changes to our school day for the next academic year, with the aim of canvassing your views on our new proposals. Not a briefing to miss!

# **SAFEGUARDING SUBSTANCE AWARENESS - SNUS & Contaminated THC Vapes**

#### **SNUS**

We are aware that some students have brought **nicotine pouches or SNUS to school**. Attached is an article to make you aware of the dangers and legality of these pouches. Students found with SNUS (including white SNUS) or nicotine pouches in school will have the item confiscated and will receive a consequence in line with the school behaviour policy. Our policy refers to smoking and vaping equipment - SNUS and nicotine pouches will be regarded in this category.

# **Contaminated THC Vapes**

Public Health Practitioner for Buckinghamshire Council, Josy Dyson, has recently alerted schools to reports of vape liquids & pens containing very strong synthetic cannabinoids 'spice' which are likely being sold as THC vapes in the local areas of Aylesbury. These are causing unintended effects in those who use them.

Here4YOUth, Buckinghamshire commissioned young people drug/alcohol harm reduction service, has prepared some harm reduction information about contaminated vapes.

# Al and Assessments A quick guide for students



#### What is Al?


Al stands for artificial intelligence and using it is like having a computer that thinks

Al tools like ChatGPT or Snapchat My Al can write text, make art and create music by learning from data from the internet. but watch out - they can also make things up and be biased



Al misuse is when you take something made using Al and say it's your own work.

THIS IS CHEATING!











- O You're not allowed to use Al tools when you're in an exam
- o Your teachers will tell you if you're allowed to use AI tools when doing your coursework - the rules will depend on your qualification
- o Even if you're allowed to use Al tools, you can't get marks for content just produced by AI your marks come from showing your own understanding and producing your own work
- Reference reference! If you're allowed to use AI tools, you must reference them clearly
- o Name the Al tool you used
- Add the date you generated the content
- o Explain how you used it
- o Save a screenshot of the questions you asked and the answers you got

Declare it's all your own work - When you hand in your assessment, you have to sign a declaration. Anything without a reference must be all your own work. If you've used an AI tool. don't sign the declaration until

you're sure you've added all the references

#### What happens if I misuse AI?

If you've misused Al, you could lose your marks for the assessment - you could even be disqualified from the subject.


